Leadership in Practice

Introduction

Being a leader isn't about having a title – it's about how you influence and support others. In this lesson, participants will explore key leadership traits, practice decision-making through problem-solving scenarios, and build trust and communication in team-based activities. They will learn how strong leadership grows from collaboration, self-awareness, and the courage to take initiative.

SET UP

Review lesson materials and determine which worksheets and handouts you will use for the lesson. Print enough pre/post assessments, worksheets, and handouts for each participant.

ACTIVITY

- 1. Have participants complete the *Pre-assessment*.
- 2. Group participants in small groups of 3-4. Distribute Leadership Traits and allow them time to mark each trait as "essential," "helpful," or "not a leadership trait." Encourage discussion within groups. Wrap-up with a group discussion:
 - Q: Which "not a leadership trait" surprise you? Did anyone check it differently?
 - Q: Which traits had the most mixed answers? Why?
 - Q: If you had to pick 3 traits from the whole list to define a good leader, which would you choose and why?
- 3. Distribute *Problem-Solving Challenge* to each group. Read the instructions and assign 1 scenario to each small group (or pair). Allow time for participants to discuss and complete the worksheet.

OUTCOMES

Students will be able to:

- Identify key traits of effective leaders and explain why they matter.
- Demonstrate leadership skills such as communication, problem-solving, and decisionmaking.
- Apply critical thinking to analyze and respond to realworld leadership scenarios.
- Collaborate with peers to complete challenges that require trust, strategy, and shared responsibility.







Leadership in Practice

- 4. Play *Minefield* team-building game. This game requires blindfolds and minimal setup.
- 5. After all students have had a chance to be the guide, debrief with these discussion questions:
 - Q: How much did you have to trust your partner?
 - Q: What made the directions clear or confusing?
 - Q: How does this connect to leadership and teamwork in real life?
- 6. Distribute the *Leadership Traits Inventory* and allow participants time to rate and reflect. This may also be assigned as independent work if time is short.
- 7. *Exit Ticket* depending on time, this can be done as a class discussion, or students can complete the worksheet in class, as homework, or in the following class.
- 7. Have participants complete *Post-assessment*.



Leadership grows through practice and reflection. Each challenge in this lesson helps you recognize that everyone has the potential to lead—by listening, guiding, and working together toward a common goal.

LESSON EXTENSION

If time allows, use the Sneak Peak activity to practice leadership and teamwork skills. This would be a great lesson extension or an introduction to this lesson. Note that you will need additional supplies for this activity.
