## My 4-H Story

Writing my speech was not the only thing that I took away from my beef projects this year. I learned a lot attending the different workshops and enjoyed getting to go to new places. The workshop in Albuquerque was fun learning about the different cuts and marketing beef to consumers. The Beef Council did a great job of showing that the partnership producer have with

them is important to your beef getting to the table. Most people know about the steak cuts you see in restaurants and your hamburgers but the Beef Council is great in teaching people about other cuts that are just as good. This marketing is what is helpful in selling your whole beef because I do not know of any cattle made up of just T-bone steaks. In Las Cruses at NMSU campus were able to learn from some of the students in the meat lab about cattle diseases. This was a fun hands-on workshop that really taught me just how important vaccines for cattle are.
