Summer slide is a learning loss that happens when your child doesn't use, or practice skills learned at school during summer break and returns to school at a lower academic level than the

Summer Slide Facts

- The equivalent of one month of learning is lost
- 2.6 months of math skills are lost
- 2 months of reading are lost
- ٠ Takes 6 weeks of re-learning in the fall

The good news: it only takes 2-3 hours of practice per week to prevent summer learning loss.


Overview New Mexico Cooperative Extension Service and New Mexico 4-H

Let's look at the big picture of New Mexico 4-H, whose program it is, who is administratively responsible for 4-H in New Mexico and how you and your family can be a part of the New Mexico 4-H program. Below you will find key points of the four-part NM 4-H 101 (part 1) module which is located in the NM 4-H Enrollment Program (Zsuites).

xtension 4-H Youth Developme

The NM 4-H Youth Development Program is **THE** youth program of the NM Cooperative Extension Service. The Cooperative Extension Service (CES) was created by the Smith-Lever Act of 1914, which extended outreach to communities through land-grant universities. This Act conveys knowledge from the NMSU College of Agricultural, Consumer and Environmental Sciences (an 1862 land grant) to the people and needs of the people to the NMSU College of Agricultural, Consumer, and Environmental Sciences.



The CES provides the people of New Mexico, and the greater USA, with practical, researchbased knowledge and programs to improve their quality of life. The CES does this through its many programs offered by the county/tribal Extension agent in **every** New Mexico County. Thus, 4-H is not the only program in the County Extension Office, although it may be the most widely known.



Program areas include 4-H Youth Development, Agriculture and Natural Resources, Family al Consumer Sciences and many other programs to improve the guality of life.

4-H is a research-based youth development program that is Extension staff supervised, volunteer led, family and community centered, responsive to change, and publicly and privately funded. The mission of the New Mexico 4-H Youth Development Program is to provide youth the opportunities to acquire leadership, citizenship and life skills (NM 4-H Policy and Procedures, 2021). There are over 200 projects to choose from in the New Mexico 4-H Program Projects include everything from rocketry to rabbits, livestock to leadership, and technology to trades.

The County Extension 4-H Agent supervises the 4-H program with the help of 4-H volunteers. 4-H programming is age appropriate and available to youth (5-19) in every NM County with the 4-H year beginning October 1 and ending September 30. build pathways between different parts of the brain, including creative activities each day will help all areas of learning.

Ways To Incorporate Creative Activities Into Your Summer:

- Encourage daily creative writing through journaling
- Have your student choose art projects and crafts to try
- Decorate cookies or cupcakes
- Buy or print coloring pages



Include The Whole Family

Involving the whole family creates valuable family bonding, encourages positive self-esteem, and makes learning more fun and stress-free.

Ways To Incorporate Educational Family Activities:

• Plan family game nights with brain-strengthening games such as Scrabble, Cranium, and card games.

- Watch educational T.V. shows and documentaries together
- Using recipes to help your student find and measure ingredients



Go Exploring

Taking day trips and exploring cultural/educational events and places fosters learning in multiple areas, including history, science, and nature. Exploration builds curiosity and encourages new interests.

Ways To Incorporate Exploring Into Your Summer Plans:


- Visit a museum or science exhibit with hands-on learning
- Take a trip to a zoo, aquarium, or botanical garden and encourage additional reading or artwork about the different animals and habitats they experienced
- Visit historical landmarks and encourage further learning

It is important to help students to find a balance between a well-deserved break from school and supporting and enhancing what they learned during the school year.




If you have been involved with 4-H for long, you are probably familiar with the Targeting Life Skills Model. With this model, skills that are needed for the positive growth and development of a young person are aligned with the four components of the 4-H pledge: head, heart, hands, and health. The model is utilized by 4-H professionals and volunteers as a framework to organize the delivery of 4-H experiences that teach the life skills identified in the model.

However, there is an element that can't be found on the Targeting Life Skills Model - Creativity! Creativity is an important life skill because it allows individuals to think outside the box, solve problems, and come up with innovative ideas. This skill is extremely important in the development of our youth. Creativity inspires collective thinking, nurtures ideas, and supports resiliency. It also promotes self-expression, boosts mental health, and enhances personal and professional development. It is an asset that connects and enhances all areas of life.

Albert Einstein once said, "Creativity is intelligence having fun."

Through our 4-H program activities, youth are provided with opportunities and projects in which they discover their own interests. Through these interests, youth use creativity to build life skills that will help them become successful, not only in their 4-H projects but throughout their life.

Although most of us may think of art and music when it comes to examples of being creative, the truth is we can see it everywhere; in the methods the architect chooses to design a building, in how a doctor puts together a treatment plan, or how a poster is laid out.

According to the University of Missouri Extension, there are several ways to encourage creativity in our youth.

1. Choices: Children who are given choices show more creativity than those who have all the choices made for them.

- 2. Stimulation: Physical environments designed to stimulate the senses can enhance creative problem solving.
- 3. Time: Dramatic play just prior to engaging in problem-solving tasks can lead to more creative thought.
- 4. Independence: Encourage children to think and act freely without adult direction, yet within the limits of rules and considering the safety of others.
- 5. Exposure: Give children the opportunity to see and experience other cultures and ways of living to help them learn to respect the choices other people make.
- 6. Brainstorming: Encourage children to tackle problems as a group by freely expressing their

ideas with no fear of a negative response.

- 7. Encouragement: When children show special aptitudes, such as an ability to generate many questions, a keen memory, advanced reading or pre-reading skills, artistic skills or other above-average abilities, adults should encourage them to build on and expand their skills.
- 8. Environment: Adults who enthusiastically encourage children to develop more than one solution to a problem see greater creativity in problem solving.

Remember:

- Our youth learn about themselves and to appreciate their unique talents within an environment that fosters creativity.
- It's about the process more than it is about the product.
- It's our job to help foster creative environments and situations for youth to practice this essential skill.

Community Service Scholarships for SLR

The New Mexico 4-H Community Service Scholarship deadline for Senior Leadership Retreat (SLR) 2024 is coming up in October. The scholarship will cover the registration expenses, or \$250 of the team fees for serving as a State 4-H Officer or Ambassador.

This scholarship is available to any Senior 4-H Member, serving as a State 4-H Officer, Ambassador, or participating in a 4-H activity. They must submit a New Mexico 4-H Community Service Scholarship application form. A revision is made to the scholarship application and a reminder regarding projects submitted. Multiple youth, including siblings cannot do the same community service project. If applications are submitted by multiple youth with the same project proposal, they will be denied. Siblings can do a community service project at the same location as long they are different projects. Applications that have community service activities through established organizations, like cleaning up trash along the highway, or just working as a volunteer for an established organization for example, will not be accepted. If the applicant would like to work with the organization in creating a new program, that is acceptable. The project must be an activity that the youth designs, organizes and implements that will have an impact on the community.
