Helen Keller is credited with saying, "Alone we can do so little. Together we can do so much." This quote resonates with me particularly when I think about the value and contribution of New Mexico 4-H volunteers.

A 2020 study involving nearly 3,000 4-H volunteers from 12 states investigated individual, organizational, and public benefits of volunteering with the 4-H program.

Individual benefits included building positive

relationships with youth, increasing confidence as a leader, expanding problem solving skills, gaining further knowledge in other areas, learning to think from diverse perspectives, and improving ability to lead meetings. Organizational benefits included time making connections in the community on behalf of 4-H, recruiting new youth and volunteers to 4-H, soliciting donations, teaching other volunteers, and volunteering for additional Extension programs. Public benefits included making communities stronger through greater connections, improving health of communities, and increasing civic involvement.

Findings of this study are certainly valuable and have useful implications for recruiting and engaging volunteers. However, other benefits of volunteering challenging to capture in a survey are missing from the information shared above.

I have had opportunity to work and visit with some of you and have listened as you speak about the joy of sharing your skills, experience, and knowledge with a young person and seeing a spark ignite as you introduce and guide them through a project. You have shared stories of a young person now earning a living using skills gained from your mentorship. And always, there are heartwarming and inspiring stories of the shy Cloverbud hiding behind their parents who now is a confident public speaker because of opportunities and experiences provided through the club you lead.

Our 4-H members speak of you as their "other mom/dad" and see you not only as a club leader but also as a supportive adult who genuinely cares about their well-being. They also share they never want to disappoint you because they KNOW you have set high expectations for them, believe in them, and generously give your time to prepare them with skills needed now and in the future.

As we grow closer to the start of the new 4-H year, thank you for all you give to the New Mexico 4-H program and the youth and families who participate. You are greatly appreciated! Laura

Gerry Copeland New Adult Leader Scholarship

Gerry Copeland was a 4-H leader for several years, but her participation grew in 4-H after her children graduated. She worked as a 4-H volunteer for 30 years by working on committees, working with the county 4-H ambassadors and taking leadership roles with 4-H leader's association events. She believed in the importance of giving 4-H volunteer leaders the professional development they needed to guide 4-H'ers.

When she died in December 2018, after a brief battle with breast cancer, her friends and family established this award for other 4-H adult leaders in New Mexico, so that they could also grow their skills, confidence, and passion for the 4-H program.

Exploring Options After High School

The thought of finishing high school is exciting, but for many it can bring about some uneasy feelings. Deciding on a path after high school is simple and straightforward for some youth and for others it can be daunting and overwhelming. Career exploration is a great tool in helping to guide that decision process, but maturity can bring with it new interests, skills, and strengths, turning everything upside down. Helping youth recognize and explore the many options available after high school can help in reducing stress in making one of the biggest decisions they've had to make.

Fortunately, there are multiple options youth can consider, explore, and pursue to help them attain their career goals and aspirations.

College

For youth who enjoy the academic environment whether they know exactly what they want to do or have a general direction, college may be their best choice. College allows students to take a variety of courses on multiple disciplines helping reinforce their chosen path or reveal new possibilities. College also opens the door for additional opportunities including, internships, student clubs and organizations, and networking helping them to prepare for their future careers.

Trade School

For those who know the career they want to pursue, are ready to enter the workforce and just need to gain skills and knowledge, trade schools are an excellent option. Trade schools range in length from one to two years and focus on a specialized job. Students learn and practice what the need to be successful in a specific job. Trade schools combine classroom learning with hands on experience allowing students to apply newly gained knowledge. Trade school careers are vast and include electrician, dental hygienist, health care technician, welder, and legal assistant.



Apprenticeship

Youth who want or need to start earning an income right away, an apprenticeship is a great option. Although similar to earning a trade school certificate or degree, apprenticeships commonly take three to five years to complete. Even though the learning commitment is longer, apprentices start getting paid right away and the majority of learning is on-the-job.

Military

Youth who have a desire to serve while building and developing skills and exploring a multitude of careers, the military may be a great choice. Students can enlist right after high school or through ROTC while attending college. Both options provide benefits offsetting the cost of education and many opportunities for lifetime careers including aviation, finance, health care, law enforcement, engineering, chemistry, and transportation.

Community College

Students who are interested in college but not positive it is the right first step, cannot afford the cost, or want or need to be closer to home, community college might be the answer. Community college allows for students to explore general education classes at a lower cost and flexible schedules allow students to work while attending. Community college gives students the option to transfer their credits to a four-year university or graduate with an associate degree usually within two years.

Gap Year

Some youth may not be ready to decide and do not know which direction to take, or maybe they just

Explorers of the Deep 2022 4-H STEM Challenge

The 4-H STEM challenge is a national rallying event for year-round 4-H STEM programming, bringing together youth, volunteers and educators from the nation's land-grant colleges and universities and the Cooperative Extension System. This annual challenge seeks to spark an early youth interest in science and future science careers. The 4-H STEM challenge presents a great opportunity to engage youth in hands on science, technology, engineering and math activities while developing critical thinking skills.



This year's 4-H challenge is Explorers of the Deep. Designed by Rutgers University, Explorers of the Deep, focuses on the mysteries and adventures of ocean exploration—with robots! Young people learn how to use science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) to explore Earth's Ocean and how it relates to all life on the planet. Activities include:

- Ocean Robot Test Tank is an activity where youth learn how to "ballast" their ocean robot by adding weights to replicate the sinking and floating behavior of a real ocean robot. They will investigate data collected by ocean robots and learn about the value of ocean exploration.
- Ocean Expedition is a board game where youth navigate their ocean robot around the world while learning key ocean concepts. Topics include aquaculture, climate change, innovation, human impact and the ocean ecosystem.

• Ocean Communicator is an activity in which young people investigate challenges that ocean scientists, engineers and technologists are currently exploring. They design and advocate for innovations and technical solutions that inspire public action.

The 2022 Challenge helps young people develop observational and critical thinking skills while exploring the interconnected nature between the ocean and humans, regardless of where they live. They will learn about the incredibly complex relationship between Earth's oceans and the global climate. Explorers of the Deep consists of three activities that can be done all at once or individually, making it highly adaptable for classrooms, after school programs, or clubs. This is a great opportunity to interact with youth through an inquiry-based learning environment and to demonstrate that science is fun.

The Explorers of the Deep kit includes clear instructions for facilitators and all the basic materials needed to complete each learning activity at home or in a small group setting. A basic kit includes materials for 4-6 youth. For groups of more than 6 youth, additional supplies (youth guides, gliders, and board games) are available for purchase. Kits can be used in spaces where physical distancing can be observed. You can also purchase kits directly from the 4 H Mall at <u>https:// bit.ly/3c2eD57</u>. need a break. In that case, a gap year might be just what they need. The key to a gap year is exploration, the only set expectation is that they do something. Students can participate in gap year abroad programs, take online classes, internships, in-depth college search, try different jobs, volunteer, learn a foreign language, the options are endless. This time can allow students to gain confidence, practice making small less consequential decisions, and step away and discover themselves.

Scholarships

The path after high school is different for just about everyone, one thing they all have in common is cost. The good news, scholarships are available. Scholarships are not just for students pursuing a four-year degree, scholarships are available for just about every option including the military, trade schools, community colleges and even gap years. There are multiple sites like Fastweb for students to search available scholarships.

The Bottom Line

Research shows that completing some type of postsecondary education (any education option after high school), leads to higher earnings and job security, increased self-esteem, more meaningful employment, and economic self-sufficiency. Education pays!
